PROVINCE-WIDE PRE-BUDGET CONSULTATIONS

As a member of the Finance Committee, I travelled across the province to hear the concerns and requests of families and businesses with respect to the 2018 budget.

Here are some quotes the all-Party committee heard:

"We went from a jurisdiction where Ontario
actually had cheaper-than-average electricity
prices in North America to being the most
expensive jurisdiction." – Craig Alexander, Chief

"62% of our members indicate that they are not confident about the economic outlook of the province. The rising cost of doing business in Ontario is hindering their future growth and prosperity and Ontario's by extension." – Rocco Rossi, President, Ontario Chamber of Commerce

"They really do need to deal with investments in rural infrastructure, in particular, broadband Internet access. Those investments are critical."

"Unfortunately, Ontario's registered nurses feel under attack in their workplaces [and that] the hospitals are overcrowded." — Cathryn Hoy, VP, Ontario Nurses Association.

"There are 684 people waiting to receive beds in a long-term-care facility in North Bay and area. Wait times range from 140 days to 1,481 days. This puts a huge strain on families and their loved ones." – Ann McIntyre, Cassellholme Family Council.




Mining for **Business**

Mattawa Roundtable




Maple Syrup Season

Representing Nipissing

These past few months have provided me the opportunity to put Nipissing's issues front-and-centre at Queen's Park through taking on some new responsibilities.

My duties in the Legislature now generally include asking the lead-off questions in Question Period. This is when I can showcase issues through a Northern lens, where they are seen and heard by stakeholders and decision-makers. I have also moved a couple of Opposition Day motions, including one on mental health, which passed with all-party support.

After the recent prorogation, the government delivered a new Throne Speech, where I made certain that our Northern voice is heard. I used many local and area examples in my hour-long lead-off speech. It really was like one big commercial for Northern Ontario and especially for Nipissing.

Most of my days are spent with stakeholder groups, as wide-ranging as forestry companies and pharmacists, miners and doctors, and grocers and steel workers. These are great opportunities to weave specific Northern comments into the conversation, and to determine if there are greater opportunities for the people of Nipissing.

Despite these added responsibilities, I promise the people of Nipissing that the extra time I spend at Queen's Park is well-spent, and that our Northern priorities are heard and understood by everyone I meet.

Représenter Nipissing

Ces derniers mois m'ont donné l'occasion de mettre les priorités de Nipissing au premier planà Queen's Park en prenant de nouvelles responsabilités.

Mes fonctions dans l'Assemblée législative maintenant, consistent à poser les questions préliminaires à la période des questions. C'est à ce moment-là que je peux présenter les concerns à travers une lentille pour le nord, où ils sont vus et entendus par les intervenants et ceux qui font les décisions primaires. J'ai également présenté deux motions de la journée de l'opposition, dont une sur la santé mentale, qui a été adoptée avec le soutien de tous les partis.

Après la récente prorogation, le gouvernement a prononcé un nouveau discours du Trône dans lequel je me suis assuré que dans le nord, notre voix soit entendue. J'ai utilisé beaucoup d'exemples locaux et régionaux dans mon discours d'ouverture d'une heure. C'était vraiment une grande publicité pour le nord de l'Ontario et surtout pour Nipissing.

La plupart des journées sont dédiés à des groupes d'intervenants diversifiés tel que, les compagnies forestières et les pharmaciens, les mineurs et les médecins, les épiciers et les métallurgistes. Ce sont d'excellentes occasions d'intégrer des commentaires spécifiques du nord dans la conversation et de déterminer s'il y a de plus grandes possibilités pour les gens de Nipissing.

As an independent, impartial body, the Ombudsman's Office resolves individual public complaints and investigates major systemic problems affecting thousands, or even millions, of people. In the past year, the Office received more than 22,000 complaints about everything from birth certificates, Northern Health Travel Grants, and ODSP, to wide-ranging issues like services for adults with developmental disabilities in crisis and the use of segregation in Ontario jails.

L'an dernier, son Bureau a reçu plus de 22 000 plaintes sur maints sujets, allant des certificats de naissance aux subventions aux résidents du Nord de l'Ontario pour frais de transport à des fins médicales, jusqu'à des problèmes majeurs comme les services aux adultes ayant une déficience intellectuelle et l'isolement dans les prisons de l'Ontario.
